

I heard the bells on Christmas Day Their old, familiar carols play, And wild and sweet The words repeat Of peace on earth, good-will to men!



Pastoral Letter

Reverend Barbara Burton writes.....

In 587AD, Pope Gregory the Great sent a monk called Augustine to England as a missionary. Augustine established his seat (or 'cathedra') and monastery in Canterbury and became England's first Archbishop. In 1170, Archbishop Thomas Beckett was murdered in the Cathedral and soon afterwards miracles were said to take place there, and the Cathedral became one of Europe's most important pilgrimage centres. The Cathedral has wonderful stained-glass windows, some of them dating back as early as 1140AD – thirty years before Thomas Beckett was killed. Those windows are full of stories. They tell of life over the centuries and record what people believed and things that were important to them. They illustrate Bible stories and the lives of saints and tell of great moments of history, of heroes from the past, and of those who have brought people closer to God.

But Cathedrals aren't the only buildings retelling Bible stories and stories of our Christian heritage. Many of our oldest churches have fascinating stained-glass windows, some have wall paintings that survived Cromwell and the Puritans, and others beautiful carvings, all keeping the story alive. Our church building dates back to medieval times and for hundreds of years people have gathered there to worship and sing praises to God. Those unable to read would hear the stories told and the beautiful artwork would remind them of what they had heard. One key festival was Christmas which we're just about to celebrate. The story of a baby, God's son, born to Mary over 2,000 years ago. His name was Jesus, also known as Immanuel, meaning 'God is with us'. It's a wonderful story to be told amid all the tinsel, and the festive cheer - after all. Jesus is the reason for the season! But the Jesus story goes on beyond Christmas. Jesus was born to be the Saviour of the world, and a modern carol tells us that he was 'Born a baby, born a King, born to laugh and born to cry, born to live and born to die, born to rise up from the grave, born for sinners, born to save'.

May you have a very peaceful and blessed Christmas.

From the Little Yellow Smart Car



There are so many ways that we can feel excluded and different from everyone else around us. There are so many ways we can be told there is no room for us. You will probably have at least one story of a time when you have been turned away, left out, felt that you didn't fit, or found yourself on the edge of what is going on. Christmas can make those feelings worse, but that is not how it is meant to be!

Light for a dark world. Bread for a hungry world. Truth for a world lost in lies. A way through the destructive tangles the world has created. Life for those who are close to giving up. A future for those who feel hopeless or helpless. Acceptance for those who feel that they don't matter. Peace for a world set on war. These are the reasons for the seasons - that God loves the world so much and that Jesus came to show us.

I pray that you will know the joy of the open door and welcome that Christmas is all about. There is room for you.

Clenchwarton Parish Council – 3rd November 7pm in the Memorial Hall

Reports

Cllr Kemp's NCC report is elsewhere in this issue although it is worth mentioning that during the meeting, a member of the public alerted her to an issue with some buses not turning up when they're supposed to which she resolved to investigate further. Cllr Whitby had little to report from the Borough Council but commented about a talk he had attended about a Wash Barrier (with a plan to sink in a couple of deep docks at Boston too) and the possibility of a road along the top which would go to Skegness – estimated cost was over 2bn. Cllr Pell then reported that he had received a revised quote to get the teen shelter on the field refurbished and asked Council to agree for him to proceed.

Public Forum.

A representative from the Memorial Hall said that a defibrillator would be going up shortly and then asked for a grant towards their new boiler which Cllr Pell said he would take to the Finance Committee. A point was made that Parish Meetings were not being widely advertised which Cllr Pell apologised for. Cllr Lucas said that a parishioner had requested access to the back field in order to cut their hedge which was agreed upon. Cllr Edwards asked about the gates that were supposed to be installed down Station Road which will be followed up. Cllr Lucas then let everyone know that work is due to start to clear the overgrowth in the corner of the front field where the cricket nets used to be. Cllr Edwards noted that the flashing road sign down Station Road was not working which Cllr Pell said was in hand.

Finance.

This month's outgoings were £7,261.75p.

Planning.

An application for the demolition of a bungalow on Main Road to build 5 large houses was discussed in detail with the Council deciding to object for a number of reasons.

Parish Poll.

Cllr Pell said that things were moving forward after providing clarification to the Borough Council on a point they raised.

Pavilion Car Park and CCTV.

A discussion took place about extending the CCTV coverage around the playing fields in order to discourage anti-social behaviour. Cllr Moate said that he would investigate further. The Neighbourhood Watch reported that they had met with the local Police Beat Officer and he had recommended that the gates to the Pavilion and the hard play area should be locked at night to discourage people from driving in and sniffing nitrous oxide after dark and this was agreed. An indicative quote had also been obtained for resurfacing the parking area down the side of Hall Road and this would be passed to Finance for consideration whenever they meet to discuss next year's precept.

Margaretta Bridge.

Cllr Edwards reported that one side of the bridge looked like it was shrinking. It was agreed that Highways would be notified. The bin in the layby nearby has also been damaged and this too has been noted for repair.

Xmas Tree

A November PC meeting wouldn't be complete without the yearly realisation that Christmas is fast approaching and someone should actually do something about getting a Xmas tree for the village after talking about it for months beforehand (but not before yet another discussion takes place first!). Members of the public wearily rolled their eyes whilst collectively experiencing deja-vu. (Tree update: As we go to press, word reaches me that one is being generously donated by a village resident). The meeting closed at 8.27pm.

And Finally.

As a PS, I'd like to give a quick plug for the Warm Hub that has been set up at St Margaret's Church. It's open daily between 10 and 4 throughout the winter months and all are welcome to pop in and warm themselves. There is also a well-attended coffee morning every Thursday between 10 and 12 with hot drinks and sweet treats as well as friendly conversation too. Finally, as this is the last edition before we break for the festive season I'd like to wish everyone a Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year. Who knows what 2023 has in store for us all.

County Councillor Report

County Councillor Alexandra Kemp, Clenchwarton and King's Lynn South 01553 630329 or 07920 286636.

Dear Residents,

The County Budget.

Norfolk County Council is consulting, until 16th December, on a 2.99% Council Tax increase next year. A general tax increase of 1.99% with a 1% increase for Social Care. This would add £44 to a Band D Property Council Tax. The Conservatives are also proposing to end the £60,000 subsidy for the important School Mobile Library Service, in addition to cutting £200,000 of the £420,000 Mobile Library Service. The County Conservatives will pour £5 million of taxpayers money into the Borough Council's £12.4 million vanity project to move Lynn's historic Carnegie Library (lifespan 120 years so far) into the old concrete Argos shop (30 more years to go and what then?).

There are over 3,000 people on the waiting list to be assessed for Social Care. The County Council is on target to overspend £7 million on Children's Services because of all the children coming into care since lock down and the cost of transport to school. The County is set on the £251 million Western Link Norwich Road but is looking for £60 million worth of cuts county wide. The budget proposes to 1) Close all Household Recycling Centres on Wednesdays. This is very unwise and could lead to more fly-tipping in the countryside and 2) reduce weed-spraying on the highway from twice to just once a year.

Sustainable Transport.

The new County and Borough Transport Plan has failed to do anything to make improvements to the 505 Bus Service or provide renewal of the steep Ferry Landing Stage. According to County Hall, the Council can't commission or run a better bus service. This is surprising, because the Buses Act 2017, says where bus services are not provided commercially by bus operators, local authorities are able to step in and subsidise additional services to meet the needs of rural communities. I am asking County Hall for the 505 to run every 20 minutes again, and go through West Lynn on every trip so people can access shops, facilities, friends and family there too.

County Councillor Report continued

Two notable recent failings by Stagecoach, include a Clenchwarton resident missing their covid jab in Lynn, because no 505 turned up for 2 hours, while the grandchildren of another Clenchwarton resident were stranded at Terrington School on 3 occasions, because the 505 "forgot" to turn up. I have asked County Hall to report this to the Traffic Regulator.

The Borough Council claims not to know who owns the Ferry Landing Stage and is happy to fund pontoons for visiting craft, but not Ferry improvements for residents. The Ferry could keep hundreds of thousands more cars out of the Southgates if it had a smoother gradient access and two handrails, and the mud flat stretch at Ferry Lane was regenerated. Let me know what you think.

Memories of Clenchwarton

Wildlife changes in the last 60 years.

In the 1950's there was much more grassland in the parish which was almost all grazed by cattle that were yard fattened in the winter. There was also much more mixed arable farming and the same crop was not grown in large blocks, all of this was good for wildlife. Farmers were also becoming aware of the dangers of Agrochemicals, indeed many of the most toxic were banned.

In fact there were less hedges and trees in spite of Dutch Elm disease which virtually wiped out one of the major large trees of the English countryside. Actually there was a lot of tree planting between 1960 and 2000 and during this period there were incentives given by the Department of the Environment for tree planting, hedge conservation and planting.

There have been however some major changes in the fauna of Clenchwarton. One animal that has nearly disappeared is the rabbit, these were very common and indeed quite a pest but they were a very useful source of meat and we often used to eat them but had to call the meat chicken to the children who had been reading Beatrix Potter books. The decline started with myxomatosis, a viral disease that I think started in Australia that was spread to England and had a devastating effect on the rabbit population until they gradually built immunity. Numbers were again increasing until recently when another disease seems to have occurred.

There has been a large increase in the number of foxes which were unknown in the area until 1960. I think that many of these came from some of the larger towns and were left in the countryside. The other animal that was unknown in Clenchwarton was the grey squirrel, we saw a red squirrel near Sandringham in 1965 but I have never seen one here. There have always been a few badgers in the area, but there are fewer hedgehogs. The animal that has increased significantly is the muntjac to the dismay of many gardeners and we are beginning to see several roe deer perhaps because of the tree planting.

Birds have in some cases shown a large decline especially the house sparrow which is now very rare when there were once large flocks. This is largely due to the shortage of winter food. In the 1960's if I went into one of our grain stores I would be met by hundreds of sparrows but because of the spread of salmonella in poultry and eggs we had to make our stores bird proof and this was the end of their food supply and they now depend on garden bird feeders !


