

Remembrance Day Reflections

I have been fortunate, working in education, that the service of Remembrance was often organised for me to participate in. In 2022 I was fortunate enough to witness the people of Adelaide showing their respects at the National War Memorial. My conversations with the Australians convinced me that the values of the Poppy appeal permeate many communities across the globe.

Last year I attended the Remembrance Service at St Margaret's Church in the village along with approximately 40 others. Clenchwarton had lost several young men on the battlefields. Each name was read out. A simple but powerful act.

Despite the global spread of the Poppy appeal, it is easy to forget. I was born in Birtley a small town just south of Gateshead. The Angel of the North looks down on the town from its elevated position. At the beginning of the First World War Britain had insufficient ammunition to match that of the German army. The Government of National Unity built several National Projectile factories and Birtley was chosen as one of the sites. The factory manufactured missile shells. My mother would later be employed at the factory. To solve the labour shortage, men were brought over from Belgium to work at the factory and temporary accommodations (known as the huts) were built to house them. My old primary school, called Elisabethville (after the Belgian queen) was a 100 bed hospital built to serve the new community. After the war the Belgians returned home. Shamefully, although the Belgian cemetary was entrusted to the care of the village Catholic church, it was often neglected and allowed to become semi-derelict, vandalised and overgrown. Thirteen soldiers from the Elisabethville community had given their lives. We had so quickly forgotten their sacrifice. Fortunately, Birtley has now rectified its mistake.

As the years roll on, many fear that we will forget the lessons of the wars despite many of our local schools being proactive in raising the profile of Remembrance Day. WW2 ended nearly 80 years ago. Much has changed. The last few years have become turbulent and the future holds many more challenges.

We would be foolish to forget:

- How close we were to losing our Parliamentary Democracy.
- How easy it was for large swathes of a country to be seduced by evil rhetoric.
- How horrific man's inhumanity to man could become.

Do consider attending the Remembrance Service at St Margaret's Church (or any other similar event) this year. The call to remember is not just a personal thing, it's a communal thing.

Remembering Remembrance Day

Last year a small book was passed to me. It contains the financial records of the collections and fund raising activities that took place within our village between 1942 &1990 for ex-servicemen and women. The book shows that records were meticulously kept and care taken to ensure every penny was accounted for and that the full amounts were transferred to the appropriate charities. Every collection tin was numbered and the amounts collected within it recorded down to a half penny.

Soon Paul Evans will be organising his team of volunteers to tackle the door to door collections for the 2024 Poppy appeal. It's a tradition that has happened within our village since at least 1942. The organiser back then was a Mr A G Skerritt of 'Antioch' Clenchwarton. In 1942 the collection was for the Earl Haig Fund, a charity set up in 1921 for ex-service personnel. The wording on the black button in the centre of the poppy, were changed from "Haig Fund" to "Poppy Appeal" in 1994.

Mr Skerritt's helpers in 1942 were mainly ladies (Edwards, Hare, Howard, Lane, Milligan, Reeve, Riches, Seamer, Smit, Tinkler – apologies for surnames only) but also two men (Myall,Baker). The recorded amount collected is £20 0s 9d, which is roughly £1205 in today's money. A significant amount during WW2.

During the 1940's other organisers were J N Reeves, V V Roberts, H J Reeves, Miss J Whitby and S A Vincent. After that two ladies played a prominent part as organisers.

Mrs L M Cooper of Jubilee Road was the organiser between 1950 and 1968. During this time money was also raised through the sale of wreaths, dances, tombolas, the Women's Institute, Bowls Drives and Church collections. During her final year £97.76 was collected, approximately £2124 in today's money. During her time as organiser Mrs Cooper was supported by several villagers acting as presidents, chairmen, and treasurers including Mr R Meek, A B Dale, A M Newton and Mr J Wake.

Mrs Cooper handed over the reins to Mrs P E Cullen of Warrens Road who organised the collections for the next 20 years at least. During this time the collection broadens from door to door to include collection tins in shops, pubs etc. The records show collection tins were placed in the school, pubs, (Black Horse, Victory and Wheelwrights), the Post Office, Shops(Vivo store, Gilberts Fish shop, Spar Stores, Linford Stores, and Gails Hairdressers) which along with a growing number of volunteers meant that the sums collected grew. In 1988, £509 was collected equivalent to £1710 in today's money.

Finally, can I pose a question for the village? The book, which holds all this information is part of the history of our village. It contains the names of many folk who between 1942 and 1990 ensured we didn't forget the sacrifices made by family, friends, neighbours and strangers during the conflicts of the twentieth century. What should we do with this book? It would be a pity if it simply got forgotten. (David Hutton)



It is all different this month.


We will be meeting at the slightly earlier time of 10.20am and from the Saturday Market Place on Saturday 9th November.

Pastoral Letter



Reverend Barbara Burton writes.....

I'm going to tell you a little about a pet tortoise owned by a friend of mine. She named the tortoise Tortoise (she's not known for her imagination). Think of Tortoise's life for a moment, please. As he wakes from a deep sleep in springtime, he eats the best of fresh new salads and vegetables, warms up in the sunshine and, filled with renewed vigour, charges around like a mad thing (mostly looking for, and maybe finding, a mate). Then after expending all that energy, Tortoise slows up, relaxes in the sun, continues eating and sunbathing whilst digesting all the vitamins and minerals required to maintain that incredible shell, and appears to thoroughly enjoy himself. Slowly as autumn comes in and the sun is lower in the sky, dampness and frosts tell of the approaching winter, and Tortoise stops eating. He slows down and becomes almost comatose as he enters hibernation and denies himself any life or exertion over the cold months.

Now I am not suggesting that we are in any way like tortoises, but there is a similarity in our life pattern. We have renewed springtime energies, slightly more relaxed summer periods and then the snuggling down of winter. During the winter we stay indoors more, maybe watch more television or enjoy more of a particular hobby, but we also have a lot more thinking time. We look back over a year, we look forward to Christmas festivities, make plans and lists and get used to the combination of cold weather and central heating. On 10th November the church helps to remember those we have lost through war. Just three weeks later we enter Advent and begin preparations for Christmas. We move from quiet sadness and grief mixed with gratitude for the lives of others, into a time when we remember that we DO have hope – not just for Christmas coming, but for the assurance of eternal life in heaven. So in the Church we are not like Tortoise – our Christian journey continues in the cold winter months as we look for Jesus' promised return.

COUNTY COUNCILLOR REPORT

New Railway Station in the Division

Norfolk County Council is undertaking the high-level feasibility study which I have asked for, on the viability of new railway stations. One location considered will be on the railway network in this Division. The race is on to find the best location to attract passengers. The Willows Industrial Estate, Nar Ouse Way, West Winch. With 6,000 new homes planned for Lynn and West Winch, new environmentally friendly modes of transport into Lynn need to be

created. The Ely Junction Upgrade will be critical to the delivery of halfhourly services and this needs to be taken forward now.

West Lynn Ferry

Turning to repairs to the ferry landing stage, three steps were replaced and a tread plate was re-secured on the Kings Lynn side ferry landing on 1 September 2024. Engineering surveys of the landing stages were planned for mid to late September, but the Borough Council is yet to report.

King's Lynn Transport Plan KLATS

The County Council's Transport Plan is up for review. It focuses on Lynn as the sub-regional centre but with 6,000 new homes in the pipeline for Lynn and West Winch, the objective is to decrease the inflow of traffic and car dependency. This is all the more urgent as the Govt has just increased the Borough's annual housing targets from 550 to over a 1,000 new homes.

Lynn has over half the jobs in the Borough at 55% and only half of the people who work in Lynn live there. Sparse public transport infrastructure mean the villages around Lynn have a relatively poor level of service placing pressure on the road network in Lynn.

With local Bus Travel below the national average, I have asked County for the 505 to be brought back to every 20 minutes. For earlier and later buses on the A10. Increase to the Ferry Capacity as a Public Sector Transport and Commuter facility. West Winch Bypass has passed its first approval state and is now critical, as the Borough recently passed Hopkins Application for 1100 homes between the A10 and A47. Improved capacity and budget for maintenance of the Clenchwarton Cycle Path is also really important.

Clenchwarton Parish Council 3rd October 2024

The meeting was attended by Councillors Coates, Lucas, Fox, Thornalley and Wilson as well as County Councillor Kemp and the Parish Clerk. Councillor Moore and Borough Councillor Bearshaw did not attend. Including myself there were five members of the public at the meeting.

As it had only been three weeks since the previous meeting, this meeting focused on reporting progress on a few areas and was relatively quick.

County Councillor Kemp provided an update from the County Council and reminded the meeting that the recycling centre is moving to a booking system to be introduced on November 18th. Councillor Kemp expressed her concerns about potential congestion caused by queuing and asked for feedback on the changes. Details of the queuing system are on the council website.

Also covered in County Council update was an announcement that entry to Lynn Museum is free from 1st October to 31st March and a reminder about Covid vaccinations availability starting during October. Councillor Kemp reported that there have been been some changes to eligibility for the vaccinations this time. No Borough Council update was provided in the meeting as Borough Councillor Bearshaw was unavailable.

The meeting quickly rolled through the agenda to village matters. The significant improvement to the churchyard since the appointment of the new contractor was noted and an agreement reached to continue with the arrangement. Councillor Wilson offered to provide some much needed additional support with trimming of the hedges.

Registering the new tractor will take about four weeks, which will allow time for some urgently needed maintenance of the garage doors to be completed before it arrives.

Signage for the memorial hall was discussed and clarification is to be sought from the County Council on eligibility for brown signs. The County Councils initial view seems to have changed.

Work on repairing and replacing the benches outside the school is planned to take place over the half term at the end of October. There is likely to be some disruption mainly to foot traffic whilst the work is completed. The village Christmas Tree was discussed and agreement was swiftly reached on what should be ordered. The vision for this year's tree sounds very exciting.

The commemorative feature stone for the Jubilee Gardens was also discussed, mainly to remind the council that this was an outstanding item being provided by the CCFT. The stone will have a plaque recognising the efforts of the sponsors and volunteers who made the gardens possible.

The last topic discussed was a request that the parish council support a grant application being made by CCFT. Should the grant be successful, the money would be used to commission a feasibility study for options to improve the social and leisure infrastructure in the village.

The next Parish Council meeting is on Thursday 7th November at 7.00pm in the Memorial Hall.

NATURE WATCH by GS

Usually we write about attractive birds and animals but today I am writing about spiders. The History of Norfolk. Part 5

We have reached 2000BC and it is around this time that Seahenge was built. It has actually been dated to 2049BC. There is actually two seahenges separated by about 100metres. The area encircled is about four times larger than the area encircled at Stonehenge. Why were the structures built? It is now generally considered that it was a burial place probably for an important person – either a leader or a religious figure. The henge was at Holme-next-the-sea but it is now at Lynn Museum. There may have been plenty of other similar structures but because they were made of wood are unlikely to remain. The Holme henge survived because of it being waterlogged in low oxygen conditions. The only other timber circle to survive in Britain with surviving timbers is at Bleasdale in Lancashire.


