Reverend Barbara Burton writes...

I am the Vice-Chair of Governors in two primary schools, and I have (unsurprisingly!) spent quite a bit of time with young children. Something that has really struck me is how uncomplicated they are. I don't know about you, but there are lots of days in the week where life just seems to be really complicated.... and even when it's not, we try our best to make things more difficult. We seem to have this ability to make all sorts of things more complicated than they need to be. Young children do not complicate things - that comes as we get older. They don't try to impress others but spend their time enjoying life.

I have also noticed that the young ones with whom I am privileged to spend time all seem to share certain traits. They are extremely forgiving. They don't harbour resentments or hold grudges. They argue over the same toy one minute but are best friends the next and they don't waste time sulking over something that didn't work out. They are very focused on their activities.

Multi-tasking seems to be the new way of living, but a really easy way for the rest of us to simplify life could be to do what children do-practice doing one thing at a time and really be 'in the moment' giving that other person or action our whole attention.

Something else young children do when things are difficult is ask their parent or carer for help. We could simplify our lives by trusting God. He loves us and hears our prayers. If we want something, we should ask him for it. If it's right he'll give it to us, and if it's not, just know that he has something better in mind. CPR and Defibrillator Training - a great success

The History of Norfolk part 4

With no parish council report in this month's magazine - they are on a Summer break - I feel there will be space for two history items as I continue the history of Norfolk where we have reached the period between 2500 and 2000BC.

It was around this time that flint mining first began at Grimes Graves. It actually continued to about 1600BC. North of Thetford, these are open to the public. Visitors descend by a ladder and are able to see the range of tunnels dug by the miners. There are hundreds of mine shafts but they interconnect with each other so the miners would have an escape route in the event of a collapse. There are still antler and bone picks on the floor of the tunnels where they have been left by the miners. It is possible that the flint was exported great distances around Britain; indeed it is believed the majority of the flint was not used locally.

There are a number of Round Barrows and also Bowl Barrows on Harpley

Common which date from around 2350BC but were in use for some considerable period. Eight barrows still survive in relatively good condition and there are at least another ten in the near vicinity. Within them have been found bones and pieces of Beaker pottery. Some of the barrows are adjacent to Peddars Way and can be viewed from it.

The largest site of barrows in Norfolk occurs at Salthouse Heath where the barrows were being built over a period of about two thousand years which is an incredible time span. A further collection of barrows can be seen at West Rudham. Some of these barrows were built in an earlier period but they were still in use right up to the Iron Age in other words they had only just fallen out of use when the Romans invaded.

Outside Norfolk the major build around 2500BC was the stone circle at Stonehenge. This involved the bringing in of stones from North Wales and the latest research indicates that the main stone came from Northern Scotland. These stones were presumably moved by sea. Most travel was by water as travel by land was very difficult as any pathways were few in number and often impassable. Elsewhere in the world the Sumerian and Egyptian Civilisations were at their zenith.

Next month we will look at an exciting development in Norfolk around 2000BC. I will keep you guessing for a month before I reveal what it is.

The History of Clenchwarton

The Village Public Houses

A while ago in 2021 I wrote about the seven pubs in Clenchwarton but I now have a little bit more information about two of them. These are the Shetland Pony and the Prince of Wales.

The Shetland Pony was opposite Banklands and obtained its name because the first owner of Banklands, Thomas Hoseason, was born at Lerwick on the Shetlands and called his house Shetland House. The pub was built around 1540 so it could not have been a pub at the start. It was probably a farmhouse and was not converted until at least 1814 because it was not until then that Hoseason came to the village. The pub was on his land and he probably named it. Some while before its demise it reverted to being a dwelling house. It was demolished around 1900. An archaeological field walk in 1986 found the exact site of the Shetland Pony and a few shards of pottery which probably came from just one pot. It is likely that a pot was deliberately placed underneath the doorway to the property. It was customary to place a broken pot underneath the doorway to a property in the sixteenth century whilst the property was being built to ward off the devil. This practice continued well into the seventeenth century.

Apparently, in the nineteenth century and possibly before, the Shetland Pony was always referred to as the Shanks.

The Prince of Wales was on the Main Road near the Victory (now the Nelson). When I wrote about it in 2021 I could not discover where it exactly was. It was evidently the same side of the road as the Victory and its owners were often the owners of Porch Farm which made me consider it may well have been close to the farm which is between the Victory and the Chapel. However, I now know it was not there, but was adjoining a blacksmiths the other side of the Victory towards Wildfields Road. It may well have been on land belonging to Porch Farm as the farmland stretched some distance in the past. On many occasions pubs are linked to blacksmiths as at the Wheelwrights in the village, but as regards the Prince of Wales, the two businesses do not appear to be linked. The Prince of Wales was still operating as a pub in 1906, but it was in that year that it was closed by the authorities in order for certain improvement works to be carried out. There is no evidence that the pub ever reopened and it is likely it was demolished around about that date.

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August's Borough Councillor report by Councillor Steven Bearshaw

Station Road -

My previous attempts to stop a resident being flooded on Station Road saw the dropped kerb raised slightly. Unfortunately, this didn't quite do the trick due to traffic splashing the puddles over the resident's hedge coupled with the slope on the pavement, which can't be raised further as future residents wouldn't be able to access the drive in low slung cars. Cllr Kemp and I met with Highways and residents from Station Road and I'm now happy to report that we have agreement for an additional drain (my preferred option from the start, but considerably more costly than raising the dropped kerb) The new drain will, unusually, be connected to the next drain on the same side to prevent the additional plumbing being placed under the road to the main drain system on the opposite side, as this will prevent the inevitable bump in the road as it settles. I'll endeavour to notify residents on my facebook page (Cllr Steven Bearshaw, Borough Council of King's Lynn & West Norfolk.) when the work is to be carried out as the road may need to be closed for safety. I'm also dealing with a similar, albeit somewhat more complicated issue in Tilney All Saints. (Clenchwarton Ward is made up of Clenchwarton and Tilney All Saints/High End).

Speeding continues to be an issue for the Ward. Earlier this year we commissioned a traffic survey. I'm sure many of you will recall the van and cameras scattered around and monitoring different parts of the village. Ironically whilst the survey was in progress the volume of traffic and speed significantly reduced.

Speed humps aren't the answer due to the village being built on a peat layer. This peat factor means that traffic hitting the humps bounces the peat and subsequently cracks the surrounding properties. This is further exacerbated when the speeding vehicle is heavily laden. My preferred solution is traffic calming chicanes, but these can't be implemented on Station road at present as updated policy means they need to be on a lit road. Sadly a motorcyclist died earlier in the year through hitting a chicane on an unlit road.

As an interim measure, the speed camera van came out to the village and by the time you read this I will have had a face-to-face meeting to understand what is possible, and the van should be a regular feature. Tilney All Saints regularly download their SAM 2 data, and this information is invaluable in understanding the worst days and times for speeding.

The grain store on Station Road has applied for a Discharge of conditions and in doing so, highlighted the noise that the wall mounted fans and grain dryer would produce. This equates to heavy traffic and louder than a food blender. The planners were reminded of its proximity to the village and the reason condition 3 was included when granting permission.

Condition 3

3. Notwithstanding the provisions of Schedule 2, Part 6, Classes A or B of the Town and Country Planning (General Permitted Development) (England) Order 2015 (or any order revoking and re[1]enacting that Order with or without modification), no fans, vents or any other mechanical plant for the purpose of drying, ventilation or extraction shall be allowed to be installed on the building hereby permitted without the granting of specific planning permission.

Home of West Norfolk Riding for the Disabled Association

An aspect of the centre's work which is gaining momentum is for home-schooled children, many of whom are on the autistic spectrum, to take up riding. The benefits are not only physical but include increased confidence and enhanced communication skills. Once this has been completed and returned, the participant will have an assessment, which lasts about half an hour and is free of charge. If all goes well, the participant will be slotted into a class (maximum 4 riders) of riders of similar ability for regular lessons.



Getting to know.....Debra McGowan

Debra will be a familiar face to the many people who walk through the churchyard as she is often to be found working in the memorial garden.

Debra was born in Bushey Heath, Hertfordshire in 1961, the second of three girls. Her Mum stayed at home to look after



She then decided to go to Israel to work on a Kibbutz in the Golan Heights. Sadly, Debra contracted malaria and typhoid whilst out there, but fortunately had a return air ticket so was sent home immediately. The UK Doctor who diagnosed her illness said if she hadn't come home she would have died, as there was no treatment being given at the Kibbutz.

After a short while spent recovering, Debra went travelling in Canada. Whilst there her purse and all her money were stolen, but the kindness of a stranger enabled her to get a train to her friend in America. From this moment Debra has never been able to ignore people in need of help.

After several jobs, she trained as a bus driver in Watford. She obtained her PSV license and could often be found driving coaches up to London, or Luton, and all the local routes around the villages. Debra loved her time 'On the Buses' and it was during this time that she met her husband Ian (also a bus driver). They were married in All Saints Church, Kings Langley in 1989 on Cup Final day – none of the choir turned up!

They bought a house in Kings Langley, in Hertfordshire, but because of very high interest rates on mortgages (16%) they had to rent it out and move in with her parents (who lived in the same road) for a while. As interest rates reduced, they were able to move back into their own home and lived there for several years. However, they finally decided to move to a more affordable area, eventually settling in Clenchwarton where they have lived for 25 years. When they bought their lovely cottage in Black Horse Road it was in a bad state of repair, but with family help they made good all the problems within about 6 months. They only had a small front garden, so later purchased the adjoining field, and turned this into the beautiful garden that many people were able to visit as part of the Church's Open Gardens Day in 2023.

When Debra and Ian first moved up here, she initially worked in the Pork factory in Kings Lynn (the worst job she ever had!). Then eventually for the Royal Mail as a van driver, often doing the run to Peterborough. Debra remained in this job for about 10 years until early retirement because of ill health.

Debra's connection with the church was really through her mother's parents, who were devout Catholics. However, Debra was not christened as a baby because her mother was a Catholic and her father was C of E. They could not agree into which denomination Debra should be christened. When Debra discovered this in her late teens, she was so upset that it was arranged for her to be baptised in her grandparents' church. Debra started going to Kings Langley church, and when she moved to Clenchwarton she started attending this church. In 2019 she was elected Churchwarden (the most senior lay office in the church), working alongside the other Churchwarden.

Debra said she likes being a Churchwarden and always tries to do her best, but finds some of the procedures a little perplexing, such as having to obtain a faculty (permission) – a very long-winded process - to do almost anything to the building. She, with the help of the Parochial Church Council, set in motion the application and fund raising for a toilet and kitchen.

During the Covid 19 pandemic lockdown Debra found it very distressing that the church building had to be locked. She loved the inside of the church but felt that the outside was very plain. Because the weather was so good she decided to plant flowers around the church wall and create a large flower bed at the edge of the memorial garden. These are now very established and look lovely in the spring and summer and provide a beautiful back drop for wedding photos! Over the years the memorial garden has always been cut by volunteers, but eventually this stopped so Debra took on this task.

In 2017 Debra was asked by Father Andrew if she was interested in bell ringing and offered to teach her the basics. She enjoyed this so much she went to ring at Terrington church to learn with a team there. Thanks to Debra we are now blessed by visits from local bell ringers every month and from September they will be ringing here every other Tuesday.

By 2021 Debra had come to realise that there were a lot of potentially isolated people in the village and proposed starting a coffee morning on a weekly basis at church. This has grown from attendance of about 6 regulars to between 20-30. She has often collected people to enable them to attend the coffee morning. Some of the regulars now help from time to time. As a result of the coffee mornings, the church has become the village Warm Hub.


The Head Teacher of our primary school occasionally asks Debra to attend school assembly and talk about a particular church related subject – harvest festival being the most popular, and she organises and leads the Christingle service in December. Debra also cleans the church on a regular basis, and a few years ago became involved in this magazine, organizing the distribution and controlling the advertising.

She has also been instrumental in fundraising for our church by means of the craft fair and other events.

Earlier this year Debra was successfully nominated for The Etheldreda Medal Award. This is awarded by the Bishop of Ely for persons whose service to community is both generous and outstanding. She will be presented with her medal at a special service in Ely Cathedral in October (more on this below). Debra said she was very surprised and felt very humbled by the nomination, feeling that she can only do what she does because of the support from others in the church, and that this is her time. Others in the past have done just as much in her opinion, but in Debra's own words: "I can never ignore anyone who needs help".

The Church of England (Diocese of Ely) The Etheldreda Medal Award

Etheldreda (Aethelthryth, Ediltrudis, Audrey - d.679), was a queen, foundress and abbess of Ely and has a significant part in the history of the Diocese of Ely.

NATURE WATCH by Debra McGowan

Our relationship with animals is an incredible one, if we are open to it. Not only do they bring us great love and joy as pets, but also they have worked alongside us since the beginning of time, and even today in modern conflicts they are with us. They are the hidden victims of war during human conflict; animals have been used as messengers, for detection, scouting and rescue, as beasts of burden and on the front line. They have been used as companionship in the trenches and continue to be subjected to warfare experiments in laboratories.

In 2004, a London monument was dedicated to the gallantry of animals in war. The script at its base reads: 'To all animals that served and died alongside British and Allied forces in wars and campaigns throughout time. They had no choice.'

One programme that had an effect on me was 'Rescue Dog to Super Dog'. In the programme two of the UK's leading dog trainers helped to find a companion for people with various disabilities. The dog trainers Jo-Rosie Haffenden and Nando Brown scoured the kennels of the Dogs Trust and Battersea Cats and Dogs home looking for suitable strays. They found a Boxer called Poppy to help Emily with a sleep disorder. A black Labrador called Parker helped Alan with his Tourette's, which sometimes left him hospitalised. Twelve year old Dom, who has muscular dystrophy, was paired with a beautiful Dalmatian called Daisy; whilst Enola, also 12, was matched with a toy poodle called Teddy. Paula, who has a faulty immune system and lives alone, was matched with a Staffie called Stanley. Ellie, who has cerebral palsy was matched with a rescue puppy called Zamba. There were many more episodes, but what was so amazing about the programme was that the trainers were able to help the dogs overcome their own problems as well as totally changing the lives of those that the dogs were matched with. What the programme also shows you, is that with patience and know how, any animal can be trained and even a wild animal can learn to trust.

In parts of Sub-Saharan Africa, people cooperate with a bird, the Greater Honeyguide, to find wild bees' nests. Once the nests are found the humans take the honey and leave the beeswax for these wax-eating birds. In Brazil and Myanmar, fishermen cooperate with local species of dolphin to increase the total catch for both species. Historically some American Indians would work with wolves to catch bison. There are many other examples of communities that work with animals and nature instead of against it.

My husband and I have a relationship with a hedgehog in our garden. She has been coming out very early in the evening, and knowing that under normal circumstances seeing a hedgehog out during the day is a sign that something is wrong, we have been closely monitoring her behaviour and health. After doing some more research we have learned that it is not uncommon for a mother hedgehog to leave her young during the daylight hours for a quick feed, before returning to them. She has now got into

the habit of coming for a feed at around 7pm. If she is in the garden I can call her over and she will literally feed from my hand. One evening when I was away my husband was outside; he came back indoors to find her in the kitchen helping herself to the cat food. She was content to stay after she had finished her meal, so he had to pick her up and place her outside. Having said that, please be aware that hedgehogs out during daylight hours is normally a sign that something is wrong. So if in any doubt please take it to the RSPCA at East Winch or contact any other animal rescue centre for advice. Thank you.

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
