



JEAN PROCTOR 1934 - 2025. AN OBITUARY

This obituary was written by Jean's family for her funeral, and they have given permission for a summary of it to be printed in this magazine.

Jean was born in 1934 and had one sister and four brothers. Her father George Collison was a farmer, and times were very hard when Jean was little. She remembered her father shooting sparrows for the family to eat in a pie. It took 40 sparrows to make a pie because they only used the breast meat of the tiny birds. The family moved to Smallholdings Road in 1938. During the war Jean remembered sitting on her bed with her parents, watching the bombs falling on King's Lynn, which she described as an awful sight.

On leaving school Jean trained as a nursery nurse in Finchley. Jean worked in private homes before moving on to a Children's Home.

Jean met her husband Pat at a dance in Dereham Memorial Hall. Prior to her marriage

Jean moved to Coventry when the Matron of the Children's Home moved there and asked Jean to go with her. Eventually She and Pat were married in September 1958 and had two children - Patrick and Jaqueline.

By 1962 Pat was serving with the RAF and this brought about a long series of moves for the family including Limassol (Cyprus) until hostilities broke out between Greece and Turkey. Jean remembered flying home in a transporter plane with the children secured to the sides of the aircraft for safety. A short time in Terrington St Clement followed, where Jean worked in some greenhouses picking tomatoes. The family then moved to Binbrooke in Lincolnshire, then Pat was posted to Aden. This time the family did not go with him. On his return Pat was posted to RAF Wyton near Huntingdon and so the family moved there. The children have fond memories of helping their Uncle David selling his strawberries out of his van to all the local families.

This was then followed by a posting to RAF Naphill in Buckinghamshire, where Jean resumed looking after children, a job she had always loved. It was here that her son Patrick decided to make some money by finding old bikes, doing them up, selling them, and also collecting glass bottles found in waste bins that he could return to the shops for the deposit money!

Another posting followed - this time to Wales, and while they were there Jean and Pat decided to buy the old family home in Smallholdings Road when Jean's parents moved to a bungalow. She and Pat settled into the house but very sadly Pat passed away very suddenly, after a heart attack at the age of 55. His death left a huge gap in the whole family's lives.

However, four years later Jean met Wilf. They married and Wilf became Grandad to Jean's grandsons. The whole family welcomed all Wilf's family in to their now quite extended family. Sadly Wilf passed away leaving Jean widowed a second time, but with help from all her family Jean found the strength to carry on.

She enjoyed many hobbies and the friendships she made in her Knit and Natter group and St Margaret's Church Thursday Coffee Morning.

Jean always said she had a good life, but that began to come to a close at Christmas 2024, when Jean became poorly. With help from family, friends and carers she was looked after at home until her conditioned worsened, so that she had to be admitted to Queen Elizabeth Hospital, where she was looked after with care and compassion by the staff on Tilney Ward until she passed away.

This year, the theme is Community as a Superpower and recognises the incredible power of lots of small acts of kindness. We have the power to change the world!

Tove Jansson published The Moomins and the Great Flood in 1945. She wrote her fairytale stories to comfort herself during the difficult times of World War 2. The story is about the Moominmamma and Moomintroll's attempts to find a new home and search for Moominpappa after the flood washed away their home. They eventually find the tall blue house, where everyone is welcome and everyone can find security, shelter, a sense of belonging, a new home and community. The themes are still important today, 80 years after that first story, they are supporting Refugee Week.





Love your neighbour is the starting place for building open, accepting, superpower-communities. The reality is often that we don't our neighbours. Perhaps this month, you might challenge yourself to greet some of

PASTORAL LETTER

Reverend Barbara Burton writes.....



Advent has a wreath. Christmas has a tree. Lent has ashes and palms. Easter has a cross, an empty tomb and signs of new life. Symbols are important in the church and help religious meaning to enter into our lives.

But in June and through the summer months, the Church Calendar tells us we are in Ordinary Time. The church colour for Ordinary Time is green, which is meant to symbolize life and hope. Ordinary Time is that part of the church year when there are no major festivals, no holidays in the Christian calendar, no special services in church. It does not mean that there is nothing going on — Ordinary Time encompasses the summer season, and so weddings and christenings are popular, as are fund raising events.

But it does mean that there is some time to do other things. I'm trying to walk more. Walking is something I like but I rarely find time to fit it in. I use my walks as spaces for thinking and praying, and sometimes in the peace and quiet of a walk I can feel very close to God, as if we are on the journey together.

But whether or not you are of a religious turn of mind, walking is a good thing. It gets you out of the house and into the fresh air with all the advantages it brings for your well-being. Let me encourage you over the next few weeks to take a walk; who knows, you may find yourself taking a journey with God and find yourself enjoying his blessings.

News from Kings Lynn Council 15th May 2025

Supporting new Mayor Andy Bullen, Cllr Steve Bearshaw, newly elected as deputy Mayor, was born in Wigan and raised in North Yorkshire. Growing up, he was extremely active and could usually be found on the golf course, the rugby pitch or 1000ft in the air teaching air cadets how to fly gliders.

A long 28 year career serving in the Royal Air Force has seen him posted to Germany, Scotland, West Midlands, Lincolnshire, Bristol and Norfolk, whilst countless detachments and Operational tours have taken him all across the world.

In his time, he's worked on many different aircraft types, from those in the Battle of Britain Memorial Flight, including Spitfires, Hurricanes and Lancaster Bombers, to the latest state of the art technology of F-35 Lightning, in such roles as the Configuration Manager, Modifications Manager, Fleet Manager and his latest, Quality Manager. A posting in 2001 brought him to Norfolk where after 10 years at Marham he settled and now lives in Clenchwarton.

Cllr Bearshaw is an Independent Councillor for The Clenchwarton Ward and was elected to the Council in May 2023, serving as the Armed Forces Member Champion and on the Audit Committee, Standards Committee, Corporate Performance Panel, Chair of Regeneration & Development scrutiny panel (until taking on his current deputy Mayor role) and the outside bodies of Armed Forces Covenant Board, King's Lynn Conservancy Board, King's Lynn Internal Drainage Board, East of Ouse Pulver and Nar Internal Drainage Board, Stoke Ferry Internal Drainage Board, Southery & District Internal Drainage Board. He's also Chair of the Clenchwarton Aircrew Memorial Charity.

He will be supported in his year in office by his wife, Marisol, who hopes in later retirement to be able to entice him back to where she grew up in the sacred valley of Peru.

View From the Gallery, by Jon Clark

May Day saw two meetings, the first at 6:00pm was the annual report to the village of the progress the Parish Council were making. Disappointingly there was only one member of the public at this meeting. There was one question from the public, asking whether the council felt there were enough councillors given recent resignations. The council agreed that additional applications for becoming a coopted council member were welcome, as this would enable them to share the workload better.

Updates from parish organisations were then invited and Clenchwarton Community Foundation Trust presented their annual report covering their activities and fund raising and where the donations have been spent. This triggered an an open discussion on the use of the Pavilion, especially during the summer months when it is frequently unutilised. Councillor Lucas explained that the upkeep of the pavilion was more than the income from the two long term hirers and that additional ways to make use of the Pavilion were being investigated to try and reduce this deficit.

The chair of the council, Councillor Coates, then provided the annual update, which is reported in full elsewhere in the magazine.

At 7:00pm the Annual Parish Council meeting started. By this time there were seven members of the public in attendance, as well as all the current council members. The meeting started with the re-election of Councillor Coates as Chair and the election of Councillor Fox as Vice-Chair for the coming year. The meeting sped through the administrative tasks or reviewing and approving various proscribed policies and documents. County Councillor Kemp provided updates on the slow progress in restoring the Ferry service as well as reminding people of the public consultation timelines for the proposed restructuring of the county and borough councils across Norfolk and Suffolk.

In Village Matters, work has started on laying the foundations for the two bus shelters that are being installed by the council. The planning application for the new car park has been handed over to the Parish Council and work on a final review prior to submitting the application is underway.

Councillor Fox provided an update on the asset mapping software evaluation he has been working on and invited the other councillors to participate. This will allow the council to maintain a single set of records of all council owned assets, covering required maintenance schedules, service contacts and geolocation of the asset.

There were no planning applications for review.

Chairman's Report 2024/2025

Over the past year, the Parish Council has continued its work to enhance the village environment and support the needs of the community.

Significant progress has been made on village improvements. We are currently working on a car park extension on Hall Road and are installing 2 new bus shelters on the main road near the Anchor. Four new benches have also been installed to replace the broken seating outside the village school which provides much needed seating for residents and visitors.

The Christmas tree switch on was once again a highlight of the year with children from the primary school performing a small selection of Christmas songs. Their involvement brought festive cheer to all in attendance and was greatly appreciated.

We have engaged a new grass cutting contractor to maintain the playing fields and grass verges around the village. We have also hired an additional part time groundsman to help maintain village facilities and public areas. To support this work, we purchased a new ride on lawnmower.

To meet increasing costs and to fund the village improvements, the precept was set at £75,000 for this financial year which represented an increase of just under 7% on the previous precept.

The Parish Council remains committed to supporting village clubs and organisations, recognising the vital role they play in our community. We provided £1,000 funding towards heating the church (the village Warm Hub) over the winter period.

We have seen some changes within the council with Councillor Steve Bearshaw resigning in September and Councillor Traline Moore stepping down in March of this year. We currently have 7 vacancies on the Parish Council if you are interested in becoming a councillor and help shape the future of our village, please do get in contact with the clerk.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank Councillors Rob Lucas, Ray Thornalley, Craig Wilson and Steve Fox for all their hard work and dedication over the past year. Your efforts have been essential to the progress we have made. I would also like to thank our Borough Council Steve Bearshaw and our County Councillor Alexandra Kemp for all their hard work in supporting our parishioners.

On behalf of the Parish Council, I would like to thank our clerk Sarah and the groundsmen Ralph and Tom who's whose hard work ensures the smooth running of the parish council and keeping the village looking its best.

The History of Norfolk Part 9 by Grahame Sampson

The defeat of the Iceni led to a period of revenge undertaken by the Romans but eventually Roman rule led to a period of relative peace for about three hundred years. For the ordinary person life was hard but for the ruling class which constituted the previous ruling class who had agreed to adopt Roman rules and customs, life had never been better. We generally think of straight roads being built by the Romans but in many cases the roads probably already existed but were improved by Roman engineers. Most of the larger settlements were along the main roads which criss-crossed the county. Going from north to south were the Icknield Way, Peddars Way, Pye Road and a road from Ditchingham in the south to Brampton via Caistor St Edmund. From east to west were the Fen Causeway and the road across the centre from Brampton to both join the Fen Causeway at Denver and to continue in a straight line from Billingford to Bawsey (this was roughly the present day B1145).

Caistor St Edmund was the administrative centre for Norfolk in the Roman period and was laid out as a typical Roman town. It had a forum, basilica, baths, temples and evidence of glass making, metal working and pottery manufacture. Today it is a large field near the Norwich southern bypass. Not just roads but also rivers were important for where Roman settlements were sited. Caistor St Edmunds was at the junction of the rivers Tas and Yare. Brampton was on the river Ant and was an important industrial centre. Pye Road linked Caistor St Edmund with Colchester via Long Stratton and Scole. The Fen Causeway linked Caistor St Edmund with Crownthorpe, Threxton and Denver. Other centres of population on the roads were at Billingford (In central Norfolk), Kempstone (not far from the present village of Litcham), Narford, Fincham, Tofftrees and Snettisham. The Romans also provided security where possible, from outside attacks and so there were forts on the north Norfolk coast at Brancaster and near Cromer and the East Norfolk coast at Caistor on sea and Burgh Castle. The latter can be seen in ruins today but is well worth a visit as it indicates the size and majesty that the fort once had.

County Councillor's Report by Alexandra Kemp

The Ferry

At the Bank Holiday, I took Harwich Harbour Ferry, to see the metal Linkspan Walkway. No steep, shaky steps, just solid infrastructure with a 1 in 12 legally-compliant gradient. On the Felixstowe side, where there is no landing stage, a fold-down metal staircase attached to the boat's prow, locks in place on the beach, for passengers and cycles to disembark.

A Linkspan Walkway on a pontoon was the solution recommended for our Ferry in the County and Borough Report in 2023. If the Council had listened to residents then, as we asked, and commissioned the solution, the new infrastructure would now be in place, and the Ferry would not be shut for repairs.

I am pressing the Council to set the opening date for the Ferry now. The boats have been inspected, courses undertaken, risk assessments drafted, work designed and put out to tender, the Rennie Jetty inspected.

Investment in the Ferry Infrastructure - Building a Consensus

I have contacted the Town Deal Board, who have £20 million in the new Town Fund for new town projects. Investment in the replacement Ferry Infrastructure from the Towns Fund is a must. At least one current Town Deal Project is likely to be undeliverable, so it is possibly that funding could be reallocated. Lynn is an older port than Harwich, and unlike Harwich, West Lynn Ferry is a commuter route, as well as a tourist attraction, cultural asset and Active Travel Hub. It is a failure of local government that Lynn is falling behind other towns, in the quality of its infrastructure. Thank you to you all who have written in with your support for the Ferry.

carriageway repairs unfortunately buried hydrants during the Clockcase Lane Road Recycling. County Hall is investigating how this happened.

Energy Alert for Economy 7

For residents with electric-only energy on Economy 7 or other cheaper overnight tariff, it is worth checking with your supplier if your electric meter has a 1980's box model. These are to be switched off on 30 June and energy bills will increase as the meter will no longer activate the cheaper tariff. A smart meter would have to be installed.

NATURE WATCH by Debra McGowan

My neighbour has a wildlife camera set up in his garden. Normally the camera picks up the hedgehog, deer, occasional fox and plenty of birds. However, recently he picked up a surprising visitor on his night camera, which we believed was either a Ferret or a Polecat. It was quite hard to make out its markings because the picture is in black and white, but due to its size it was clear that it was too big to be a stoat or a weasel. The video of the animal was sent to the Vincent Wildlife Trust who confirmed that it was a Polecat. Before we were told that the animal was a Polecat we also wondered whether it could even be a Pine Marten! This is not as strange as it sounds as Pine Martens are occasionally found in Norfolk, though they are not common.

Pine Martens were once found across the UK, but habitat loss and persecution wiped them from almost all of southern Britain. With protection under the Wildlife and Countryside Act, the Scottish population has slowly began to recover. To help them return to southern England, Gloucestershire Wildlife Trust launched project Pine Marten- a collaboration with partners across the country and region, including Vincent Wildlife Trust. Between 2019 and 2021, 35 Pine Marten were successfully introduced to the Forest of Dean. The hope is that these Pine Martens will connect with the expanding Welsh population and help establish a resilient Pine Marten population in the south-west of England. Since then there have been further releases in England. Pine Martens have been sighted in Thetford Forest and even on the Sandringham Estate.

The sighting of Polecats in Norfolk has been increasing steadily and this was most likely what was seen on my neighbour's camera. The Polecat is not a cat, but a Mustelid, belonging to the same family as the stoat, badger and otter. Like a stoat it has a long back in relationship to its legs. Its fur is buff brown above, but darker around the tail, legs and neck. It has a pale face and its 'bandit mask' is its most obvious and endearing feature.

The Polecat's natural prey are rats, voles and rabbits. They do not climb like a Pine Marten, and avoid swimming like Otters and therefore there

is no competition with similar native mustelids. The recent increase in the Polecat numbers has had a beneficial effect on native wildlife, as the slightly smaller, but highly destructive American Mink appear to be driven out of Polecat territory. This gives water voles and wetland birds a better chance against the natural predator they evolved alongside. Although Polecats will take birds and particularly their eggs, it is their taste for rats that means that their presence actually reduces the number of predators that are likely to find and feast on eggs and chicks. With the gradual spread of their cousins the Pine Marten, this could have a similar effect on the Grey Squirrel.

The reintroducing of native species which have become extinct is controversial, but I believe like a lot of people that the benefits to nature and the environment are immense. Hopefully one day we will have lynx back in our forests along with many other native species. That is of course if our land is not overrun with Solar panels, windmills and wires!


